Passage I:

A Haunting Novel

With the 1987 publication of her Pulitzer Prize-winning novel *Beloved*, Toni Morrison established herself as one of the most important American writers of the 20th century. The tale of its main character, an ex-slave named Sethe, was inspired by a true story of a slave, Margaret Garner, who escaped from her owner in Kentucky in 1851, but was recaptured in Ohio. Before the actual recapture, when it was clear to her that she and her children would return to a life of slavery, she tried to kill her children as a means of sparing them the <u>inevitable</u> hardship and suffering that Garner knew too well. Garner succeeded in killing one of the children, and was imprisoned for the crime.

In Morrison's novel, Margaret Garner's tragedy is fictionally recreated in the life of Sethe, an ex-slave haunted by her daughter's death and befriended by a strange and beautiful young woman named Beloved.

In *Beloved*, Morrison uses her command of poetic language and her considerable gifts as a storyteller to explore the relationship of parental love and destructive power that forms between Sethe and the ghost of her murdered daughter. Rising from the ashes of the nearly unimaginable pain that provoked her death, the young woman named Beloved appears as a sign of supernatural <u>redemption</u>. Morrison herself has said that in her own life, she believes in ghosts, for without them, she "would have been dependent on so-called scientific data to explain hopelessly unscientific things." In *Beloved*, Morrison has created a powerful and enduring story based on two of the most unscientific things of all, love and redemption.

Passage II:

Imperialism and the Internet

Cultural imperialism, a term first coined in the 1960s, refers to cultural hegemony, or the domination of other nations, specifically as practiced by the United States, through the dissemination of a consumer ideology. Critics of the US point to the **plethora** of US cultural products, such as music, television, movies, news, and technology. They argue that the ubiquity and influence of US cultural exports threaten the cultures of other nations and communities. With the growing popularity of the Internet, many countries worried about an unregulated and uni-directional flow of information have approved policies to control the amount and types of information available to their citizens. Those who oppose regulations declare that the leaders of these countries are opposed to freedom or progress. However, those in favor of regulations believe that their cultures and very identities may be under siege.

Herbert Schiller, a communications scholar, asserts that although the advent of an information society and <u>innovations</u> such as the Internet have been heralded as democratic, in reality both information and technology are controlled by a wealthy elite. Within Marxist theory, this is explained in terms of the "core" versus "periphery" argument, which posits the presence of global imbalances between "core"

and "periphery" nationals. Core nations, such as the United States, are those with political power and economic advantages, while the periphery nations are poor, so-called Third-World, nations. According to this perspective, information flows from the core to the periphery. Periphery nations are, thus, unwitting consumers of core values, ideology, and assumptions embedded in the information they receive. Those who believe in the theory of cultural imperialism point to the <u>ubiquitous</u> US television shows and McDonald's restaurants found worldwide.

On the other hand, others argue that this theory is too simplistic because it does not account for internal dynamics within societies, and it views culture as deterministic and static. It assumes, according to its critics, passivity and a lack of opposition on the part of the "dominated" group or nation. In fact, many argue that rather than being dominated by US culture and media, people in other cultures tend to transform the intended meanings to ones which better suit their own cultural milieu. Thus, it is argued that rather than becoming "Americanized" for example, Asian societies have "Asianized" US cultural exports such as McDonald's.

Other critics argue that although cultural imperialism may indeed be a factor in the exportation of certain US media products, the Internet is a different matter. It is argued that the Internet, unlike other media, has no central authority through which items are selected, written and produced. Instead with the Internet, information can be disseminated from anywhere and from anyone, meaning that information is transmitted multi-directionally. Contrary to being a tool for cultural imperialism, the Internet allows individuals to participate in their own languages and to engage in preserving and celebrating their own cultures. It is argued that the Internet, rather than promoting cultural imperialism, may in fact promote multiculturalism.

In 2000, Christopher Hunter presented a paper at the International Institute of Communication Annual Conference in which he argued that although more "traditional" types of US cultural exports may be open to reinterpretation and resistance, the values embedded in the software used in computer networks like the Internet are difficult to resist. Hunter explains that Microsoft's Windows operating system, for example, although developed in the US, is used in over 90% of the world's computers. Microsoft accepts cookies, which track users as they go online, without telling the user, thereby forcing the user to accept US cultural privacy norms that may differ greatly from those in their own home countries. In fact, as Hunter points out, issue of privacy invasion have been a major concern for European countries. Thus, Hunter claims that those who use computers may find it difficult to resist the values and beliefs embedded within their own software.
